

Registration is open for this year's Research Day, held on Friday, March 31.

This year's theme is **Reimagining education for an equitable, sustainable, and connected world**: In the past few years, the world has undergone intense changes, the nature and pace of which are unprecedented. The disruption and uncertainty caused by the Covid-19 pandemic have highlighted that we cannot continue life as usual, and this demands a different educational response. This conference is an invitation for us to come together to rethink education for a world that is equitable, sustainable, and connected. We welcome proposals that engage the themes of social justice, environmental justice, technology, and education. While these themes raise important questions, applicants should not feel limited to addressing these themes only. We, thus, also invite proposals on other education-related topics.

EDST Blog: Call for Submissions



The EDST blog is open for submissions! The editorial team invites EDST students, faculty, and staff to submit contributions to the blog. While we welcome contributions for all topics related to education, we invite authors to consider the topic of "**Community**" as a theme we can gather around. *How are communities formed? What does it mean to live, work, learn, or educate in community? What goals might educative communities hold in common?*



Submission Process:

Blog posts (typically 500-1,500 words) may take on many forms, including <u>public-facing scholarship</u>, <u>blogging about university or student experiences</u>, co-authored pieces, narratives, poetry, or multimedia posts. <u>Submissions</u> are accepted on a rolling basis, with priority to those submitted by April 14th.

Other topics include the kinds of qualifications that matter most in different trajectories, how to decide whether to apply for

postdoctoral fellowships, and how to decide when you should you start applying for jobs. And of course: all other questions related to post-PhD trajectories are welcome!
